

Recognition

On Reading Melvyn Bragg's Memoir, Back In The Day

It said – we can make something of this life, we are all in this together; the way is to see it through together; it was recognition."

There are times when time seems to be suspended Like a silver thread held up for the sun's inspection, A weightless wire connecting memories and dreams - Supple, steady to ride the rise and fall of each breath.

Death may be like this minus the sensation of loss, That nothing can be held without its passing into Something out of reach you fear you cannot catch As you watch the light trace its lingering farewell.

Pictures build and mass like cumulating clouds into Recollection. Reading your childhood translates mine: Parents, brother, grandmother, neighbours, friends Slide and merge in flimsy images, fleeting glimpses

Of incidents uncompleted, wisps of stories that might Have been, fitful snatches of hope and disappointment Wrapping over each other like yesterday's newspaper Interleaved with the day's before. Your memoir my mentor,

Mirroring the smiles and mouthings of our dead, flitting Through your lines and page-breaks, almost touching in Voiceless echo. Dust stirred into dancing flecks of light, Shards of memory splintered into momentary alignment.

It is good to celebrate our loved-ones' contentment, their Communal belonging their passing preserves in silenced Recall. A disparate throng of ghosts brought together into Recognition, discovered in backs of drawers like home-

Movies unspooling birthdays, weddings and christenings, Parties in paper hats, a prize catch, sandcastles before the tide Returns, our dog braced to chase after the thrown ball, an Uncle sculling us across a lake, Mum a shrieking teenager

Perched behind him on his motorbike, holding on tight, Dad and his workmate grinning through the firm's van Window, hand on the steering wheel, foot on the brake: Paused before they all slip out of focus, flicker out of

Life. We knew what happiness meant then, snatched Out of the daily drudge and drizzling grey, our well-Being glowing cheeks and pulsing veins, willed to Remain and reassure, as now while the clouds dissolve.

I try to catch one now, gingerly in case I drop it, hold it up to the light for scrutiny. Is it the earliest? Apart from the markers of monochrome snaps of events – my joint christening with cousin Jeanette in Fareham, babes in arms; a studio professional portrait propped up on pillows, enveloped in white, looking lost, legless; on Southsea common with long grey socks and bare knees and a grey cap, matching grey overcoat buttoned up to the chin, arms stretched round shaggy Duffle as tall as me, both of us laughing or barking – the narrative of time is collapsed into unordered snatches, that come and go like the changing pattern of a kaleidoscope. I like this one, wish I could hold it up to a lens for capture:

I am on the floor with my soldiers, lining them up for inspection. Their legs are in motion, on the march, rifle held to the chest, upright, eyes fixed forward. One holds bagpipes, wears a busby and a kilt over tartan stockings; another blows a cornet; a third wears a French horn round his neck like a scarf; a fourth beats a bass drum before him. They are on the point of entry to the silver fort, in file, 'left-right-left...', I call in a no-nonsense voice of command as the door opens behind me and ushers sharp voices raised in greeting, speaking indecipherably at once. A car purrs past behind them. The front door closes heavily, I can hear them more clearly now, a man, two women, one is my mother. A sudden rush startles them, blows past me, hair tickling my ears, and Duffle scatters my army, tail swishing the military band off the ramparts onto the lino. It will be my job to restore order, set the ranks straight again. Duffle is always forgiven

Splashing water, banging a yellow duck on the zinc rim of the bathtub that other times I can see from the highchair hanging on the wall outside

Being lifted up near the ceiling, legs kicking the air, the lightbulb swinging wildly under its shade, shouting 'Daddy!'. He is always laughing in my earliest memories, enjoying a joke with Mum or my uncles, or popping up out of the sea on a wave like a porpoise, the sunlight glistening on his shoulders

Another cot next to mine. A boy with dark eyes standing up and rocking the frame. He wasn't there before

I want to reach one, hold the clothes peg up towards it - Cut now, in the present of sitting on a chair in another house, eighty years later, tapping out memories as
